Global Mental Health: Perspectives and Methods in Global Mental Health Research

Perspectives in understanding and treating mental illnesses have, in the last decades, gone

beyond the bio-medical to embrace social and cultural approaches. This stems from the

understanding that mental health conditions are both diverse and complex and their diagnosis,

treatment and prognosis should be embedded in understanding experiences surrounding illness

and the cultural context of mental illness.

The study allows students to understand both the bio-medical and social-cultural perspectives of

mental illness as well as methods of researching global mental health.

The course is practice-based and requires students to apply methods in global mental health to

demonstrate complexities of mental health issues and treatment. Participants in the course will

develop research plans and do research projects which fall under one of the three thematic

research areas below:

1. Social and structural origins of mental illness in a global context

2. Treatment approaches and access to care in low-and-high resource settings

3. Task sharing and alternative care models.

Course participants will receive guidance in developing their research plans and completing the

research projects which they will present at the end of the semester to earn a grade. The final

presentation should demonstrate the participants' comprehension of the complexities of

understanding and treating mental health.

Scientific methods to be applied.

1. Literature review

2. Case study analysis or interviews (a combination of both would be prioritized)
